Political Economy of Peace and Conflict I - Conflict

Conflict is a persistent element of human history, and its current impact is unprecedented since World War II. By 2022, 108.4 million people had been forcefully displaced—2.5 times more than a decade ago—while civilian deaths rose by 50%. Today, six out of seven people globally experience a sense of insecurity. In response, Sustainable Development Goal 16 aims to promote peaceful societies, ensure access to justice, and build effective, accountable institutions to guarantee freedom from violence and fear for all individuals.

This seminar focuses on intrastate conflicts, or civil wars, exploring their causes, continuation, and consequences. Students are introduced to key theories, concepts, and research methods to analyse variations in war and peace across time and countries. The course combines academic readings, simulation games, and interactive activities to develop critical thinking and the ability to evaluate research and apply knowledge to case studies.

As an introduction to peace and conflict studies with a focus on the political economy of conflict, this seminar lays the groundwork for a follow-up module, "Political Economy of Peace and Conflict II – Peace." Students are encouraged to take this seminar first to build a solid foundation for understanding the complexities of civil war and broader peace studies.

International Political Economy (IPE) - Theories and Empirics

The increasingly integrated global economy challenges governments to address policy making (in various policy areas) taking both the national and global dimension into consideration. Looking at where the interface of international and domestic policy making lies, this course introduces students to IPE theories in general and the gro- wing research body in IPE. To do so, the course combines a general textbook with published articles in high ranking journals. The first part of the course will familiarize students with IPE in general and crucial actors in studying IPE – voters, parties and government. The second part of the course will then focus on political decision making in trade and monetary policy in the international context. The third part looks at effects of globalization on e.g. child labour, foreign aid, and government spending. Particularly, in the second and third part we will also look at empirical testing of theo- retical explanations.

This course on the "Sociology of the Body" addresses a social category which has been overlooked in many early sociological theories although bodies are everywhere in society and "serve as the substratum for social life" (E. Bernstein). Yet, multiple approaches to theorizing and researching the body have emerged in recent decades. Wewillread studiesfrom scholars of the 20th century until today and examine the processes by which individual bodies are shaped by social structures, waysin which bodies are socially constructed, represented and used – and, in turn, shape social life. We will understand bodies as situated within particular social and historical contexts and address a range of contemporary issues to illustrate this perspective. The body will be addressed not as a pre – social physical objective fact, but as something interpreted through the lens of society and culture.

This course will primarily explore the development of death studies within sociology, adopting a multidisciplinary approach. We will examine death as a cultural, physical, and metaphysical phenomenon. You will gain insights into how death is culturally embedded, how different societies and cultures confront death, the medical perspectives on death, and the implications for individuals and groups. Death possesses both personal and social dimensions, which is why we will focus on grief and bereavement, seeking to understand the impact on those who remain and how culture shapes these experiences. The aim of this seminar is to provoke thoughtful consideration of a topic rarely addressed in public discourse and to explore the reasons behind this reticence.
